How happy and blessed were the days I spent under your roof, how fortunate I was when removing to Switzerland (that ~~Alps~~ matchless country) to be able to take pleasure in recalling to my mind, and took pleasure in confirming those noble sentiments with which you inspired me, and although in after years I studied under worthy governesses and teachers, I confess

been occupied with so many things.

Elizabeth's conduct has indeed been what no body could have expected; born a Jewess, having enjoyed the privilege of Christian Baptism, and Christian education, to fall into such a delusion not to say idolatry, as to forget her duty to her Country, her parents, and her religion, and ignobly embrace the detestable sentiments of a traitress. From purely selfish motives - Were such the precepts she was taught, Did she never learn our Holy Scriptures, did she never receive ~~from~~ from your mouth, one particle of moral and religious instruction as you unmercifully taught us every day of your life and by your example enlightened our tender minds, filling our souls with religious and patriotic ardour.
