I suppose you are still at base; I would like to be able to have a peep at you all, I imagine

you sitting under the vines, by the dining room door, as we used to do when I was with you, but I do not suppose the 'police' allows you to be out late at night, is Miss Bessie still so strict with you?

On wednesday Aspasia Causo came out to see me, she was very anxious to hear how you all were. She is looking very well, and sends you much love; she seems to remember every one, and asked after all her friends, especially after you and Mrs Hill, and Miss Aspasia & Mrs Victoria to whom she begs to be kindly remembered.

Has Miss Mary heard from Mrs Gray?
Mrs Dickson received letters from our dear friends the Arnolds, the contents of which I need not write as he will very likely give you the letters when you meet.

The Kings passed by Corfu on their

way to Berlin. Thomas went on board to see them, and they went and paid a visit to his mother, but they had no time to see anything of the country 'which is the only thing worth seeing' as they had no time, I was very sorry I could not see them but hope to have that pleasure on their return. I hope you have been benefitted by the country air, Mrs Hill I suppose feels quite rested and ready to begin her round of duties again.

How is dear Miss Aspasia? Please remember me kindly to her, and Mrs Victoria and all the rest of the teachers.

My brother and sister wish to be kindly remembered by you all. Please to give much love to dear Miss Mary and all the young ladies, and with as much for you Mrs Hill and Bessie
