

Syra, Feb<sup>y</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> 1836

My dear Brother Hill,

Neither the steamer from  
Constantinople nor Trieste has arrived  
so I cannot know whether you have  
written your promised letters and must  
write my letters to Athens without  
having received any from there. The  
news from yesterday by the French  
seem farther to establish that we shall  
have peace. The Queen's messengers who  
left London as they said that Lord  
Clarendon was to start for London  
the next day for Paris - & Brunnow  
had already arrived. Prussia will  
not participate in the conference

so far as the difference with  
Pupis is concerned. Afterwards,  
as the general concerns of  
Europe, she may. - Mr Klöbe  
has at last finished his business  
and leaves to-day for the  
Piræus with the rest of the  
family of Mr Beck. he will  
likely stay a few weeks  
at Athens and so you will  
see him! - He has among the  
rest some unpleasant business  
to finish with Bucherer and  
Luca Galli at the Piræus  
having received orders to that  
effect from some house in

England  
London with which he is  
connected. I wish that he may  
be able to discharge his duties  
wisely and as much as possible  
in a friendly manner - In  
the last account - money for  
which I sent by the last through  
Messrs Bish & Hume - nothing was  
mentioned as to the German  
leaves given by Mr Heaizing -  
Be kind enough to tell me  
whether there is any thing due  
to Mr H. from my part that  
I may bring it in order -

We continue in good  
health, thank to our heavenly

father - and hope to  
be the same respecting  
you all. You do not  
mean in any thing  
respecting Elizabeth's  
she still is free and  
will she remain there  
long? Having nothing  
else to do I add  
only love from all of  
us to you all &  
remain
