I have read with
the deepest grief and
sorrow, the account You
have given of my poor
Sister Eliza's death, and
of the care You have taken
with these poor Orphans.
For which Sir pray accept
my most grateful thanks
and gratitude -

The accounts You give of

the unhappy life of my dearest
sister have shocked and
distressed me to distraction,
as the measures which my
cousin Mr. Tuite of Sonoma
and myself adopted
seven years ago were made
to oblige Salamos to trust
my poor sister Eliza with
more kindness and having
all power and authority in
my poor sister's hands so
far as money was concerned.

so that I am quite at a loss to
discover how the poor children
were so destitute as described
by you and Sir Thomas Wise,
for I can assure you that for
the last 7 years all my sister
Olivia's letters spoke most
favorably of her husband
Salamos, and that he was
quite a reformed man,
but perhaps he compelled her
to write these letters -

I inclose a letter to these poor
orphans which I shall feel
for ever obliged by you

delivering into their hands.
I am to meet Mr Tuite on
Wednesday to try and arrange
something about the final
settlement of these poor children,
and until then I will feel
quite sure that you will see them
taken care of -

and gratitude to Sir Thomas Win
for the interest ~~for~~ the interest
and kindness he has shewn to
these poor orphans -
