My dear G. W. B. A.

Having heard of your safe arrival in Athens from your recent tour, I had hoped to have received some communication from your midst, as to your well being, Spiritually & Temporal, in which you know we are concerned in Christ Jesus; & more especially since the very severe & trying circumstances which you have been called to undergo; to comment on them I feel is vain, one can only look up in wonder & amazement, for I was not at all prepared for such a termination to the matter in question when we left you; I thought that the Parents, having expressed their entire confidence in your principles & motives, & continuing to send their children would be the means of providing the Sustentation from the attacks of the Vice & the Evil.

We were very thankful of B. dear Mary
for the long account she kindly wrote
to us just before leaving for your projected
journeys, & we should have written
an answer, but that we knew she
was not in Athens; but I must say
that Pedrus has not treated us well
in not giving us one line to let us
know how you fared on your way;
if she remains behind you in Athens
or Mary seemed to expect; however
I hope to learn that you are essentially
benefitted & supported, tho' as the effects
