he gave to my mother has  
kept and we, presently, are in  
such despair, being treated only  
by him so cruelly, that in such  
a Christian College, where eve-  
ry body lives harmoniously,  
except the Greek.

My mother in her last letter  
sends her loves, to Mr. Hill,  
& Miss Elisabeth.

Demetrius is quite well, and  
salutes you.

Mr. Cobson from some days ago,  
went to Gozo, where I think he  
will not stay long time.
