My Dear + Rev Sir

Your interesting note reached me late last evening per day.

If Mr King could hold on in Athens until the 10th of April he would have Mr Murray on charge at Naples with him, who might be of some assistance. But I think he does very right to leave his wife and family - to keep his only right in the country. I agree with you most perfectly in all you say about that adventurer and what has become of him I don't know and might well add care.

I never saw him but once -
He wrote me a letter to excuse
his conduct which I never noticed.
I can not write much of this part
as I am much engaged - but I
hope you will have the seal
of office delivered to you or John
state in a letter which goes to
night to Mr Marsh - and so I
shall mention to Mr Messrs who
with his wife will be with you by
next packet - and you will find
them very nice people - He was
formerly M.C. and is from Phil^D.
Perhaps you have read the interesting
book of travels in the East which
he published at the time of his visit
6 or 7 years ago.

Mr Morris writes me to day that
I am in disgrace with the
Neapolitan Gov^t and that
I am "prohibited" from
entering Naples that beautiful
city which is under such a
casualty rule. For what reason
I know not, unless it is for my
active agency in protecting the
poor and unfortunate refugees
who have claimed my protection,
when some despotic Consuls wished
to have them banished from Malta

Mr Morris in kind regards
