

Sauguna 15<sup>th</sup> February 1854

My dear Sir

I duly received your note of the 20<sup>th</sup> ult. & beg to offer my thanks for the same.

I have therein observed with pleasure that the harm produced by the accident with your Bone of Proops, has found an easy remedy & I beg to assure you that it has afforded me the greatest pleasure to be of any service in this occasion.

The said Bone was not accompanied with a Box of Tacking & it was only by mere chance, that one of our people having to return other Bones from the Custom House, took the Bone with him by mistake - I consequently paid no Freight thereon & the expenses incurred are in my trifling that they are not worth notice.

I offer to you in particular my dear Sir, my sincere thanks, for your cogent & salutary appointment to the heredit-  
-ary Norwegian Consulate at Sauguna.

I am well aware that I owe much to your kind recommendations

in my favour in this affair & I would have  
written to you in person, to thank you  
most warmly for the kind part you have  
taken in my favour, had not Mr.  
Abbot undertaken to do it personally in  
my behalf.

I beg now to  
render the expression of my gratitude to you  
on this occasion.

S. D. Lyons is now in the  
Black Sea & I am in hopes that he may  
come to buy me, when I shall call to  
pay him my respects.

I have made Enquiries  
with two American vessels lately arrived from  
the States, about the Bony mentioned by you,  
for the present they have been unsuccessful.

I trust they are all well.

I thank God & with my kind Remembrances  
to yourself & Family what I have also

accept on my part or that of Mrs. Pemberton.
